Message from The Smith Family CEO

Dr Lisa O'Brien

The past month has been exciting for The Smith Family with our release of a major research report showing a close link between school attendance rates and Year 12 completion levels.



The report – Attendance lifts achievement: Building the evidence base to improve student outcomes – is the first Australian study to demonstrate the relationships between students' school attendance, achievement in English or Maths, school completion and post-school work or study.

Using data from more than 30,000 Australian students, we found three in four (75 per cent) students with high attendance in Year 7 completed Year 12, compared to less than half (48 per cent) of those with very low attendance. The research also found students with very low attendance in Year 7 who improved their attendance by Year 9 were much more likely to complete Year 12. These findings mean we can identify students at risk of not completing Year 12 from as early as Year 7, and provide them with the additional support they need to improve their attendance and grades, ultimately increasing their likelihood of finishing school and moving on to further study or work. The report has been distributed to all VIEW Clubs and can be downloaded from the smith family.com.au/research.

I am delighted with the progress VIEW Clubs and the new National Executive have already made this year. From the 1,245 student sponsorships you fund, to the growing collaboration with our retail stores and strong community voice, your dedication to our cause is making a difference.

I was thrilled to hear about the three unstoppable VIEW members — Past National Vice President, Lyn Geer,

Carolyn Taylor (Greensborough VIEW Club) and National Councillor Sandi Muntisov (Eltham VIEW Club) — who assisted with selling raffle tickets to 720 people at a Melbourne function in February with our partner, HSBC. These members helped to raise \$10,700, which will be matched by HSBC! I thank each of them personally.

In March I learnt that former Learning for Life student Paul Ell was the recipient of the coveted Tom Harvey Award for Citizenship 2018, following a nomination by VIEW. For many years, I have witnessed the growing relationship between Paul and VIEW, including the evocative speech he delivered at the 2015 VIEW National Convention in Wollongong. With nurturing from VIEW Clubs, Paul has become a strong advocate and ambassador for The Smith Family, the *Learning for Life* program and VIEW. His special connection with VIEW is helping to ensure more disadvantaged students can receive the educational support that has been so crucial in his life. This is just one example of the power of VIEW in the wider community.

I wish Jan Roberts, Annette Schlafrig and Pat McRae all the best in their roles as the National Executive 2018–19. Finally, I thank you all for your contribution and enthusiasm for The Smith Family and supporting the education of disadvantaged young Australians. We couldn't achieve our work without your support.




VIEW cheer squad

International Women's Day celebrations with VIEW

VIEW members championed for gender equality with a range of events in early March.

As one of Australia's leading women's volunteer organisations, International Women's Day, held annually on 8 March, has become an important date on the VIEW calendar. Many clubs host events that not only celebrate the achievements of women and young *Learning for Life* students, but also shine a light on gender inequality and other issues of importance to women. With the 2017 #MeToo campaign still resonating, this year's events spread the message of

In New South Wales

In addition to regional events in areas including Yamba, Lennox Head, Tweed Heads, Bathurst and the Central Coast, events were held across metropolitan Sydney. VIEW members from central and southern Sydney invited community groups including Probus, Zonta, Lionesses, Lamrock Committee and Red Cross to a luncheon in Peakhurst, while in the Macarthur, Southern Highlands and Illawarra region, 120 VIEW members and their guests came together at Camden Civic Centre.

In Peakhurst, National Vice President Pat McRae gave the opening address, touching on this year's International Women's Day theme, 'Press for Progress'. Guest Speaker, Linda Peach, from the Workplace Gender Equality Agency, referenced research on gender equality and shared her own personal experiences. Award-winning Indigenous actress, Leah Purcell, captivated the audience with the story of her life. Her message was: "Know who you are, believe in what you are doing, be confident and comfortable in making mistakes, give hope to others. Power to you, sisters."

At the Camden event, National President, Jan Roberts urged members to not lose sight of the power of VIEW's collective voice. Guests also heard from Learning for Life student Andela, who is in her first year of university and has been supported by The Smith Family throughout her education. Andela passionately shared how difficult it was for her family after her

father died suddenly and how The Smith Family played a significant part in her life and helping her mum to pay for school fees and school clothing. Captain Melinda Barnes from the Royal Australian Navy was the event's keynote speaker, sharing her story about women standing up for what they believe they must do, particularly in respect to sexual harassment in the workforce.

In Western Australia

Members and friends from VIEW's seven clubs in Western Australia (WA) came together for two celebrations. First Wave VIEW Club held an event at Marmion Angling and Aquatic Club, while West Coast VIEW Club hosted a lunch at Hillary's Marina. At the West Coast event, guest speakers included lan Moore, General Manager of The Smith Family WA, who spoke about

the important contribution VIEW makes to The Smith Family; and keynote speaker, Dr Pam Lynch, a life coach, mentor and motivational speaker. The highlight, however, was hearing from *Learning for Life* student, Tyler, who was supported by The Smith Family throughout school and university. Raised in a single parent family, Tyler had dreamed of becoming a diesel mechanic, but realised he wanted a career where he

could 'give back'. Giving up a scholarship with BHP, Tyler chose to study primary school teaching so he could help students who needed that little bit of extra support, like himself. The Smith Family's support eased the financial burden for his mother and gave him the resources and support he needed to complete his university degree. Tyler thanked VIEW and The Smith Family for helping him achieve this goal.

In South Australia

Marion VIEW Club hosted a luncheon at the Marion Community Club. South Australian author, Tricia Stringer was the event's guest speaker, entertaining attendees with stories of how she became a writer and the writing process. Guests were also treated to a presentation from three milliners from Studio Hats Unley. Over \$2,400 was raised from raffles, a book stall and jewellery stand. This money will be donated to The Smith Family for their educational programs for disadvantaged students.

Grafton

Grafton VIEW Club celebrated its 50th birthday in November 2017, a great achievement for this small club of 30 members. The club hosts regular social functions to bring members and their friends together. One of 2017's highlights was a high tea function where members learnt how to make chocolate pretzels. In 2018, the club is hoping to hold a fashion parade in collaboration with a local shop. As a small club, members often join with sister club, Urunga VIEW Club, for birthday and Christmas celebrations.

Maclean

Maclean VIEW Club has 45 members and sponsors six Learning for Life students. The club hosts a major fundraising event each year to help fund the sponsorships. Additionally, regular trading tables and raffles help to supplement fundraising efforts and ensure the club can also contribute to The Smith Family's educational programs for disadvantaged students.

Bellinger Valley

Bellinger Valley VIEW Club is located in the historic small country town of Bellingen. Formed in 1986, the club has 44 members and sponsors five *Learning for Life* students. The club's major fundraising events are two street stalls held annually in the Bellingen town centre, featuring home-made cookies from members.

Monthly raffles and the trading table help the club raise funds each month and mid-month outings such as kegel bowling, croquet, outings, "soup and slice" days and Melbourne Cup functions contribute



additional funds and also build strong bonds of friendship.

This annual event is an opportunity for VIEW representatives across SA to come together to share insights, learn more about The Smith Family and get inspired for the year ahead. The highlight of this year's event was the speech delivered by Learning for Life student, Rueben, who has been supported by The Smith Family from a very young age. Rueben is now completing an Honours Degree at Flinders University and told attendees that without the support of The Smith Family and his sponsors he would have dropped out of school by Year 12. Rueben is from a family of three boys, raised by a single mother. He became very emotional when he shared that he is the first person in his family to complete Year 12 and go on to university.

Attendees also heard from SA's new Zone Councillors, Janice Spraakman and Anne Strangway, VIEW National Manager, Maryanne Maher and The Smith Family General Manager of SA/NT, Graham Jaeschke. Program Coordinators, Cassandra Wisman and Kalindi Benson invited members to visit them in schools to see how The Smith Family's volunteering program and Learning Clubs work.

Collectively, SA VIEW Clubs currently sponsor 88 Learning for Life students. National Councillor Marlene Powell used the event to encourage clubs to support another student in 2018 to increase the state's sponsorships to over 100. A representative from each club was also asked to share their club's plans for the year to inspire new fundraising initiatives, outings, guest speakers and activities across the state.

200 members and 30 students

Aspley VIEW Club (QLD) is the largest VIEW Club with nearly 200 very active members. The club, which recently celebrated its 23rd birthday, supports 30 Learning for Life students. At each monthly meeting, the club holds raffles and a trading table (selling craft, jams, pickles, home baked goods, recycled jewellery and home wares) to raise funds for The Smith Family and student sponsorships. Additionally, several members run a 'book table' which makes a huge contribution to the club's

overall fundraising. Throughout the year, books are also sold at a stall outside the club's local shopping centre helping to promote the club to the general public. 
