Breaking the bias this International Women's Day

In what has long been a highlight on the VIEW calendar, clubs across the country came together to mark International Women's Day (IWD) and support gender equality. Here's a snapshot of some events.



n Western Australia, West Coast VIEW Club celebrated on 2nd March. Despite some last-minute challenges as a result of increasing COVID-19 cases, the event was a great success.

First WAVE VIEW Club (WA) hosted a lunch with members from Western Suburbs VIEW Club (WA) attending. A father of *Learning for Life* students spoke passionately about the support given by The Smith Family to his three sons. In keeping with the IWD theme "Break the Bias," Sue, an Air Force pilot, spoke about working in a male dominated sector.

In New South Wales, events were held across the state, including in Goulburn, Tamworth, Tweed Heads, the Mid North

Coast, Central Coast, Bateau Bay and South West Sydney, to name a few areas. Seventy members from VIEW clubs in the New England region came together for an event in Tamworth. Members from Bonville-Boambee VIEW Club enjoyed a fun celebration at Sawtell RSL with members dressing in purple. At South Tweed Sports Club, three inspirational women shared their stories with members from Twin Towns Evening VIEW Club and surrounding clubs.

In South Australia, Gawler VIEW Club partnered with Gawler Zonta Club, Girl Guides and the CWA to host an IWD breakfast for women in the community. This was the 20th year of the collaborative breakfast. Five VIEW women attended to hear

guest speaker Andrea White tell her story of breaking the bias.

In Victoria, various events were held including a function for members from Sunbury-Macedon Ranges VIEW Club (VIC) and other VIEW members and their guests at Club Sunbury. The event's guest speaker was Jill Gallagher, CEO of Victorian Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation.

Attendees reported it was a very enjoyable day for all.

In Queensland, a breakfast hosted by Bribie Island VIEW Club was one of several fun events.

The Smith Family's history



The beginning

On Christmas eve 1922, five businessmen walked into a Sydney orphanage with gifts. They walked out inspired to improve the lives of children experiencing disadvantage. Preferring to remain anonymous, the men called themselves as "The Smiths."



VIEW and The Smith Family

In 1960, at a time when women were excluded from many aspects of public life, George Forbes, then General Secretary of The Smith Family, saw the potential for an organisation that enables women to come together outside the home, to socialise, network and assist others less fortunate through The Smith Family. VIEW Clubs was born.



Education support

Known for delivering food and clothing packages to families in need, in 1987, The Smith Family asked families what was most important to them. Their response: "help us educate our children". EDU-CATE was developed to provide scholarship support, including financial assistance, support and mentoring for students.



Learning for Life

In 1997, EDU-CATE became a full sponsorship model and was renamed *Learning for Life*. By 1999, there were 7,000 students enrolled in the program.



Today

The Smith Family is now Australia's largest children's education charity, working with 179,760 children and young people in need in 90 communities and 736 partner schools across the country. More than 14,000 VIEW Club members around Australia support The Smith Family.

VIEW joins Centenary celebrations



he VIEW National Executive were delighted to be part of The Smith Family's Centenary event at Admiralty House, hosted by Their Excellencies, The Governor-General of Australia and Mrs Hurley.

In his role as Governor-General of Australia, His Excellency meets people



from all walks of life. In his speech he praised what he sees as the Australian spirit of community and generosity, but he made special mention of The Smith Family and VIEW Clubs as epitomising this spirit of giving.

"There's no denying the impact of The Smith Family in its first 100 years ... Its programs continue to give young people the tools and resources they need to make better futures for themselves." he said.

"[It also] continues to give young people who have slipped through the cracks the greatest gift of all – hope," he continued, before thanking VIEW members, donors, sponsors, partners and volunteers of The Smith Family.

Doug Taylor, The Smith Family's CEO echoed His Excellency's words, talking about the transformative power of

education for young people in need and what has been achieved with the support of donors and partners, including highlighting VIEW's longstanding partnership with The Smith Family.

"I want to acknowledge our VIEW Clubs – over 14,000 amazing women. They have been supporting The Smith Family for over 60 years and they are change makers in nearly 300 communities and play a vital role in creating strong social connections, the bedrock of a strong community." Mr Taylor said.

"It was such a privilege to attend the Centenary celebration to represent all VIEW Club members," said Marg Woodhouse, VIEW National President.

"Being there to hear the Governor-General, The Smith Family Chairman and CEO all acknowledge the longstanding partnership and contributions from VIEW over more than 60 years was very special. Every VIEW member should be extremely proud.

"We were delighted to chat with VIEW's Patron Mrs Linda Hurley and to meet The Smith Family's Centenary Champion Wendy Harmer and inspiring *Learning for Life* student, Priva."

Your support is making a difference

Here's a snippet from Priya's speech for The Smith Family Centenary.

"I wouldn't be at university without The Smith Family. In 2018, I was awarded the Katrina Dawson Prize. This is given to girls on The Smith Family's *Learning for Life* program who demonstrate

strong academic performance, show promise in community leadership, and for whom the financial support would make a meaningful difference. For me it made a huge difference. It helped me to buy a laptop...I needed that computer, because I was studying a university level subject by distance...a pass in that

subject would mean early entry into Macquarie University.

"If it weren't for The Smith Family and the Katrina Dawson Award, I wouldn't have been able to afford that computer, and my future could have been very different. Now I am the first person in my family to study at university, which is something I am very proud of. My younger siblings now have someone to ask about tutorials and lectures, about moving away to study, or how to enrol in subjects. I can now answer questions for them that no-one could answer for me."

Hobart members paint, sip and raise funds!

obart VIEW Club, the only VIEW Club in Tasmania, has a small but dedicated group of members who strive to create fun ways to raise vital funds to sponsor their *Learning for Life* students.

After realising it was difficult to attract younger women to VIEW, the club's committee decided to take a different approach. They sought to 'make connections' with a broader, younger group of women by inviting them to VIEW fundraising and social functions as "Friends of VIEW".

By attending VIEW events, Hobart's Friends of VIEW can learn more about VIEW's partnership with The Smith Family and donate to the club, without the commitment of monthly meetings which can be difficult when juggling work and family life.

The idea has been successful with two younger women recently hosting their own VIEW fundraising Paint 'N Sip

Liv Dobson, a local artist and teacher, and Kylie Swain, the school nurse at a local school attended Hobart VIEW Club's Literary Afternoon Tea last November. After learning more about VIEW, the pair decided they wanted to organise a fun painting afternoon with donations going to Hobart VIEW Club and The Smith Family.

The afternoon was held at Dodges Ferry Community Garden with 18 participants including four VIEW members. There was a mix of ages and painting skill, but everyone had a wonderful afternoon in perfect summer weather!

Participants paid a donation to VIEW and all materials were supplied by the organisers. An amazing \$1,000 was raised – enough funds to enable Hobart VIEW Club to sponsor one more *Learning* for Life student!

"Our thanks to Liv and Kylie the organisers. We spent three hours painting with Liv's gentle encouragement and had a wonderful afternoon," said Jane Kerrin, a VIEW member who attended.

"Connecting with a broader and younger group of women has been one of the aims of our club over the past year.

"We are delighted to be at this point where our "Friends of VIEW" enjoy supporting The Smith Family, just like we do. It was such a lovely day - we hope to repeat it!"

VIEW from Two: Carleen and Sonia

Carleen Maley and Sonia Workman call themselves virtual VIEW friends. The pair, who work closely updating VIEW's website, rarely see each other in person yet have formed a special friendship based on mutual respect and care for each other.

Carleen:

I joined Bega Evening VIEW Club (NSW) in 1979 as it appeared to be an exciting new initiative just for women, coming to our small country town. I am the VIEW Website Administrator. I first met Sonia via Skype in 2016 when she volunteered to become a member

of the Website Working Group. She was such a guick learner and reliable.

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Working on the website together has strengthened our friendship. I can phone Sonia with my computer frustrations and my personal problems. To me Sonia is a carer, who has the skill of being a good listener. She actually hears the written word, and listens to the frustrations of our new club computer people.

Sonia is a very dedicated and confident person, with a kind generous heart.

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Sonia:

I was invited to a Milton Ulladulla VIEW Club (NSW) luncheon in May 2015 and joined in June. I had never heard of VIEW and having recently retired to a new area it sounded like a great way to meet new people.

In 2016 I became Publicity Officer for my club, with very little idea of what the position involved. Then somehow I ended up on the Website Working Group! This is when I met Carleen who trained me and others via Skype.

I now have a supporting role, assisting Carleen where I can.
