

Celebrating a milestone VIEW's 60th celebrations commence



In March, 60 years since the first VIEW Club was formed, members in New South Wales, Tasmania, Queensland and South Australia came together to mark VIEW's 60th Anniversary Diamond Jubilee at very special Vice Regal events.

hen 120 VIEW Club members presented themselves at NSW Government House Sydney for a 60th anniversary morning tea, few would have thought their historical knowledge would be put to the test.

Yet, a quiz about 1960 - the year of VIEW's founding - was one of the many delightful moments shared with Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC, Governor of New South Wales, the host of the special occasion.

The Governor's morning tea, held on Tuesday 3 March, was a fitting way to commence celebrations to mark VIEW's 60th Anniversary Diamond Jubilee. Joining Her Excellency and Mr Wilson were VIEW's National Executive, members from several VIEW clubs throughout NSW, Mr Nicholas Moore, Chairman of The Smith Family, and other representatives from The Smith Family.

In her speech to guests, The Governor congratulated VIEW on its significant contribution to the community and The Smith Family, saying she enjoyed welcoming and celebrating groups like VIEW who have contributed so much to Australia over a sustained period of time.

Governor Beazley referred to the song *"From little things big things grow"* written by iconic Australian lyricist Paul Kelly, when reflecting on the evolution of VIEW, from one small club formed in a living room in Balgowlah Heights in March 1960, to the organisation it is today, with 15,000 members in more than 300 clubs across the country.

"We don't know whether George Forbes was particularly prescient or whether he simply knew how big hearts can work," she said. "On behalf of the people of New South Wales, congratulations on your Diamond Jubilee and thank you for your unstinting service and the contribution you have made to the education of the children of this state and to developing the voice, interests and education of Australian women along the way." VIEW's National President Anne-Louise O'Connor thanked the Governor for her warm welcome and hospitality, before reflecting on the six decades of VIEW and its strong future ahead.

"Very few organisations survive to celebrate 60 years yet we begin this celebratory year, with the opening of two new clubs!" Anne-Louise said.

"Today VIEW provides a supportive community for all women, no matter where they live, connecting with one another, forming lasting friendships, acquiring new skills, and supporting each other and their community."

Anne-Louise's sentiments were echoed by many of the members who were able to attend the morning tea on behalf of their club.

Pat Wright, a founding member of Macquarie Ryde Evening VIEW Club (NSW) said she was thrilled to be at the event with her fellow member, Catherine Collins.

"Being able to support disadvantaged children - as well as

With other groups, you don't get the community aspect nor are you able to participate in different things, like VIEW offers. Our club has 23 members and sponsors three *Learning for Life* children through fundraising activities – we're punching above our weight," she said.

Ellen Gray and Madge Doust, members from Lugarno Evening VIEW Club (NSW), had a ball at the morning tea, catching up with old VIEW friends and making new ones. The pair have been firm friends since meeting through VIEW, regularly enjoying long lunches to catch up on each other's lives outside of VIEW.

"Today is very special for VIEW," said Ellen, who believes the community of VIEW offers something unique to women through its friendship network and support for The Smith Family's work.

Vivienne Brown, who travelled from Springwood to attend the morning tea, enjoyed exploring Government House, learning about past Governors and catching up with VIEW friends.

"It has been wonderful to be here, to walk through the rooms and see the historic furnishings. It's terrific for the NSW Governor to recognise VIEW's work in local communities and acknowledge our longstanding and valued partnership with The Smith Family," she said.

Other Vice Regal events also took place during March in Hobart, Brisbane and Adelaide. More local celebrations will take place later in the year, along with a 'Diamond Jubilee' High Tea and 'All that Sparkles' Gala Dinner, both on Friday 30 October 2020. ongratulations to the VIEW members and committees who organised and hosted International Women's Day events in March. Here is a recap of some activities that took place in the VIEW community.

In Melbourne, a combined luncheon saw close to 200 VIEW members from Melbourne-based clubs, and their friends, gather at Docklands for a very entertaining afternoon. Guests also heard from Lainie Anderson, an author and journalist. A fashion parade followed lunch, resulting in many guests scurrying to the dressing rooms to try on new outfits. It was a fun-filled and entertaining afternoon for all.

Marion VIEW Club (SA) hosted their 8th 'VIEW and Community' lunch at the Marion Hotel. More than 200 VIEW members and friends enjoyed hearing from guests speakers, Janice Spraakman and Emma Grigson-Gair, and watching the fashion parade.

In Perth, VIEW members from West Coast VIEW Club (WA) enjoyed a luncheon at Hillarys Yacht Club, where significant funds were raised to support the club's 21 *Learning for Life* students and other programs run by The Smith Family in Western Australia. A highlight was hearing from two students currently sponsored through the *Learning for Life* program. Selina (21), who wants to be a performing arts teacher, and Christina (16), who hopes to become a lawyer, spoke about how their lives had been transformed by



the support given by VIEW and The Smith Family. The event's keynote speaker, Angie Paskevicius, spoke about her life journey and leading not-for-profit organisation, Holyoake. Ian Moore, The Smith Family's Western Australian General Manager, thanked VIEW members for 60 years of support through sponsorships, fundraising and volunteering.

Several events were held across NSW. At Bateau Bay VIEW Club's luncheon on the Central Coast, there were 70 guests including women from other local community organisations. The event's guest speaker was Roya Moddi, an Iranian woman who recently moved from Sydney to Tamworth. Roya spoke about the differences of living in Australia, capping off an entertaining and inspiring afternoon.

Batlow VIEW members band together after fires

or Zone Councillor Janice Vanzella and some of her Batlow VIEW Club friends, last summer's devastating bushfire season changed their lives.

Batlow VIEW Club in southern NSW is a small club with 17 active members. With four members directly impacted by the bushfires, the club, which turns 30 this year, has banded together to share stories and support each other as a very different future unfolds for some.

"It's amazing how a catastrophe changes the course of your life," said Janice, one of the club's members who lost her family's home.

When the Dunns Road fire changed direction and headed for the tiny township of Batlow, Janice's home on the outskirts of Batlow was destroyed. Janice, Past President of Batlow VIEW Club, and her husband Tony had already evacuated with a few possessions, leaving behind a treasured home and garden of 35 years on 11 acres. It was three weeks before Janice was able to return to see her home in ruins.

For fellow Batlow VIEW member, Kath Hughes, aged 92, there hasn't been an opportunity to return to Batlow. Unfortunately, due to the randomness of the fire, Kath's home was one of the few dwellings fire crews were unable to save in the town itself. Kath was evacuated to her family in Sydney and is yet to return to Batlow. Janice, who has been in contact with Kath, said the active and fun-loving VIEW member has made the hard decision to relocate to Sydney to be closer to family.

Janice and Tony have also decided not to rebuild, and instead will move to Sydney.

"We'll ease our way out and eventually go to Sydney because three of our children live there. We can be together as a family more often. A lot of people our age have to make a lifestyle change. For us, this is the time to make that lifestyle change," she said pragmatically.

Another VIEW member, Sue Turnley, who also lost her home outside Batlow, has had to rethink her retirement plan. Sue and her husband moved to Batlow from Sydney around 10 years ago. They now face the prospect of rebuilding or finding another place to call home.

The impact of the fire has been a little different for Batlow member Beth Pearce and her family. While Beth's home was spared, large areas of her family's grazing land, including stock, were lost as the fire ripped through the region. Her family's business - now run by her son - has been hard hit by the losses, forcing them to rethink their future plans. Several other VIEW members, including Batlow VIEW Club's Treasurer Janet Verwey, Vice President Ann Miles and Publicity Officer Val Rooney, were also affected by the fires. Some lost fences, pastureland or sheds, while others were evacuated during the catastrophic conditions.

Throughout the days of the fires and the months following, Janice said her VIEW community was always there to help each other.

"My VIEW Club friends have definitely been a source of support. We were all constantly checking on each other."

Janice has been a member of Batlow VIEW Club for 29 years, serving on the committee for 28 years, until stepping down this year to take on the role of Zone Councillor. Janice said that although she plans to move to Sydney in the near future, VIEW will always be a part of her life.

"I have been committed to VIEW for a long time and I have enjoyed it so much. I've got so much out of it and I think the work they do for The Smith Family, through the *Learning for Life* program, is just phenomenal. My VIEW Club friends are my best friends. I will definitely seek out a VIEW Club in Sydney wherever I go."

Two new clubs in Victoria
